



Education

The University of Florida College of Dentistry — one of six colleges at UF Health — is dedicated to high-quality programs of education, research, patient care and public service. For the past seven years, the DMD students have achieved a 100 percent pass rate on Part 1 of the National Board Dental Exams. The college received more than 1,500 applications for 93 openings in the 2014 entering DMD class. In 2011, the college established a School of Advanced Dental Sciences to facilitate integration of advanced study in endodontics, orthodontics, pediatric dentistry and periodontology.

Research

The College of Dentistry Department of Oral Biology is one of the top-ranked in the U.S. based on National Institutes of Health research funding among similar departments. The oral biology faculty includes national leaders in oral infectious diseases and immunology research. The college is nationally recognized for its oral health research enterprise, emphasizing infectious diseases in dentistry, bone biology, pain and neurosciences, and translational research to improve clinical dental care.



Patient Care

DMD students perform dental care, supervised by faculty, for a wide range of patients in a professional dental environment. Through the University of Florida Statewide Network for Community Oral Health, the college provides affordable, high-quality dental care for a large number of low-income adults and children in Florida. The NCEF Pediatric Dental Center, in Naples on the Collier County campus of Edison College, opened in December 2008. The center, funded by gifts and matching state funds, provides increased access to care for pediatric patients and enlarges our pediatric dentistry residency program.
